THOUGHTS ON READING THE NOTICE SHEET AND A GUIDE TO CONTENTED LIVING

Every week, when you open your Notice Sheet or read it online, do you, especially if you are a relatively new member of the St Michael's church family, wonder who some of the people are whose names are mentioned as being unwell or housebound. I was reminded of this a few weeks ago when I came across a 20year-old copy of the Link magazine. It contained an article written at the time of my father's death, and I am reproducing it here because I think it has a something to say about our attitude to those names today. The article was entitled "Charlie Sweeting. Many thanks and some reflections" and it began by thanking those who had sent messages of sympathy. It went on:

"We have been sustained by your prayers and touched by the obvious affection in which [Charlie] appears to have been held by many in St Michael's, where he worshipped for over 70 years. For those newer to St Michael's, Charlie Sweeting was simply a name in the list of house-bound on the weekly notices sheet and it is this which has prompted me to write the following.

Dad died on 3 August [2003] after a full life, most of it as a committed Christian believer. He joined St Michael's in the early 1930s, becoming among other things a Sunday School teacher, local secretary of the Sudan United Mission (later Action Partners) and a member of the PCC for over 50 years. Friends have spoken of him as a great encourager and, even in old age, one with a real heart for young people.

In the winter of 2001, his arthritis and a succession of falls rendered my father housebound and not at all mobile. At the same time my mother, Gertrude, died after nearly 57 years of happy marriage. Dad's whole life changed, yet he adapted. Despite bowel cancer, diagnosed in 1998, and although very dependent because of his arthritic state, he was determined, if possible, to stay in his own home. This he was able to do until the last few days of his life.

He remained interested in the outside world, particularly St Michael's. So thank you to all who remembered him and the other housebound members in your prayers – in Sunday services or when using the notices sheet as a prayer guide at home. The housebound are still very much a part of the church family. If Dad is anything to go by, they in their turn pray for the more active church members.

Dad appreciated being told that someone in church had asked about him and enjoyed seeing any who visited him; Charles [Mason]'s visits with Holy Communion were a very special time. Every Sunday evening, Tom, Dad and I would read Evening Prayer together, followed by a reading aloud from John Bunyan. Those who visited Dad often commented on his cheerfulness and positive attitude.

His secret? He aimed with the Lord's help to live by a dictum of St Paul. He mentioned it to me on a number of occasions and after his death I came upon a little slip of paper in the Bible he used for his daily study. It read, "Phil 4:11 Own motto. C.S". The verse – "I have learned in whatsoever state I am to be content" (NKJV).

I thank God for my father, Charlie, and thank you for your support"

That was what I wrote twenty years ago, and I hope it has some relevance for us today when we think of our present unwell and housebound. In my own life I hope I can live out the contentment of Philippians 4:11.

FARMING SEASONS

Looks like we are in for a roller coaster ride with the weather this year and that can be concerning for any farmer, especially with harvest starting and no sign of settled weather forecast. Saying that I am pleased to report that our harvest has started and we finished combining the oil seed rape in the early hours of this morning, and it is all safely gathered in!



Two years ago, the week before we were about to start combining oil seed rape, had we а thunder and hail storm which all but ruined most of the This year we crop. have had a good crop and, to be fair, the

crop has been looking good for most of the year. Oil seed rape has a large tap root which meant it was obviously able to draw moisture successfully during our very dry and hot June. The wheat crop now only needs some warm sunshine to be ready to harvest as well, but it is always difficult to predict how good the crop is going to be until you actually start combining it.

With half an eye on the cereal markets, these too have been up and down largely affected by the war in Ukraine and the dry and hot weather in America. No one, however, is expecting the high prices we experienced last year and this is good news for those who are worried about more food price inflation. Hopefully next month I will be able to report on a successful wheat harvest, but I am experienced enough to know that you cannot take anything for granted!
