THANK GOD FOR MR. RAY

We gathered at 3.00pm on a Sunday afternoon in a building belonging to what was popularly known as the 'Plymouth Brethren'. Mr Ray told us what the Apostle Paul taught, making it very plain that we nine year old boys needed to come to Jesus Christ who died for our forgiveness and rose again because he was our Lord.

GOING HOME & GIVING UP

Returning home for tea, I went to my bedroom and asked Jesus Christ to receive me. Then after a few weeks, I left Sunday School!

FAST FORWARD A COUPLE OF YEARS

My mother cleaned for a retired vicar and his daughter. One day she knocked at our front door. 'Would I like to go to a Bible class for boys at her church?' Next Sunday I turned up at Mr. Furlong's Bible class. I loved it. They knew how to present the message of Jesus Christ to boys my age.

'WOULD YOU LIKE TO JOIN THE CHOIR?'

Yes. So, Sunday by Sunday, I listened to the Vicar, Peter Baker. The impressive thing about him was that his life matched what he said in the pulpit. I heard his sermons with great interest. Plain

sailing from then on? No. True to form I gave up the Bible class and the choir.

A FRIEND AND THE 6.30pm SERVICE

Somehow or other (I can't remember the reason why we did it) a friend and I started to go back to the evening service in Christ Church, Barnet. This gave me the opportunity to take stock of my life. Was I going to live for Jesus Christ at school and home? What did that profession of faith all those years before mean? My life did not match up with what I was supposed to believe.

DECISION TIME

Like youngsters today, school kept putting choices before us. Then it was what O' level subjects were we going to do? What did we want to do on leaving school? It was a natural point to make decisions. Amongst those decisions, I felt I had to start to live up to the commitment I made at nine years of age.

FAST FORWARD AGAIN

Mr Ray, Peter Baker – now I came across another man. His name was Thomas Watson. He got me out of a painful experience. The sad experience was depression. At 19 years old, I had everything going for me. Yet a great cloud of sadness enveloped me. One of the effects was to make me ask myself, 'Did God really love me? (Yes, a sad, self-centred and introverted question I must admit).

STRANGE TITLE FOR A BOOK! 'A BODY OF DIVINITY'

Thomas Watson lived in the 1640's. His book, 'A Body of Divinity', was about God, especially the great mercy, love, and kindness of God. Under God it proved to be a milestone on the journey of knowing Jesus Christ better.

NEVER TO BE FORGOTTEN

Returning home for the Easter holidays, I went with my parents to Holy Communion. At that service, Jesus Christ became very vivid and real to me. As I heard the words, 'This is my body given for you', I had the sense that he went to his crucifixion because he loved me so. The depression didn't end then. The experience of that church service is still in my memory. It set me on a road with my Bible whereby I joined the KGB! – 'Know God Better'.

A DAY WITH KATIE @CYO

As I start my second year with Christian Youth Outreach (CYO), I thought now would be good to give a more detailed update rather than a quick chat over coffee at the end of a service.

Things are going really well. I've very quickly got to grips with what schools want and how I can deliver that to the children in a fun and exciting way.

I'm writing at lunch time on Monday 9th October and today I have visited 3 schools.

Firstly, I presented an assembly on the story of Mary and Martha to Key Stage 1 (KS1) children, reminding them that we need to take time out of our busy daily lives to stop and talk or listen to Jesus.

From there, I was straight on to meet Sheena to help some Year 4 children answer the big question...'Where do religious beliefs come from?' We look at the Big Story of how the printed Bible came to be the wonderful library of history, songs, prayers and stories that we have access to today.

Then, it was time to deliver a lunch club session to some Year 3 children, where we looked at the story of how Jesus is so powerful he was able to raise Jairus' daughter from the dead.

No two days are ever the same as I get to visit so many local schools, and show them the love that Jesus has for all of them. Comments and questions also vary from each session, like today being asked if Jesus could bring back to life their dead pets.

At the end of each session, it's great to see the children leave with a smile on their faces as they think about what they've just learnt and hopefully, I've left each of them with the idea that Jesus is for all and how amazing their lives could be if they choose to trust and believe in Him.

My work, and the work of the others on the CYO team is only able to happen with the help of *you*. CHURCH WILDLIFE EXHIBITION AT THE LIBRARY

St Michael's Eco-Church group will be staging a display called *Making Your Garden Wildlife Friendly* at Braintree Library Dome Gallery from Thursday 2nd to Tuesday 7th November.

The exhibition suggests simple steps people can take to promote wildlife in their garden or green space. The first 100 visitors can collect a free packet of wildflower seed, and factsheets with practical tips.

St Michael's are working towards an Eco-Church award, run by Christian environmental organisation, A Rocha. Promoting care for God's creation and encouraging bio-diversity is part of that award, so we have started to develop Church House garden, aiming to make it a haven for wildlife in the town centre. Through planting and developing the garden with wildlife in mind, we have already seen an increase in bees, butterflies, and the range of insects and birds. All the photos in the display were taken in our church garden.

Can we encourage you to support the exhibition, pick up a packet of wildflower seed, and think if there is something you can do in your garden to encourage a wider diversity of wildlife. For instance, if you have little space for a wildflower meadow, seed sown thinly in a pot or tub would also work well.

The library is open from 9am to 5.30pm Monday to Friday and to 5.00pm on Saturday, and would be very pleased to have a stream of visitors throughout the week.

LET DOWN YOUR NETS

"Then Jesus entered into one of the boats, which was Simon's, and asked him to put out a little from the land. And He sat down and taught the multitudes from the boat. When He had finished speaking, He said to Simon, "Launch out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch". But Simon answered and said to Him, "Master, we worked hard all night and caught nothing, nevertheless at Your word I will let down the nets". When they had done this, they caught such a great quantity of fish, and their nets began to break; so they signalled to their partners in the other boat that they should come and help them. And they came and filled both of the boats, so that they began to sink. But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' feet, saying, "Depart from me, for I am a sinful man, O Lord!". For he was astonished, and all that were with him, because of the catch of the fish which they had taken. And so also were James and John, the sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. And Jesus said to Simon, "Fear not, from now on you will catch men". So when they brought their ships to land, they forsook all and followed Him." (Luke 5:3-11)

Sukkot is a Jewish festival about rejoicing in the blessings that God has provided, but let's be sure our focus is on the Lord of blessing – instead of the blessings!

We read in Luke that Jesus told His disciples to go into the deep waters and let down their nets for fish. When they did, their nets were filled up with fish to the point of breaking. Being fishermen and businessmen, they may have been tempted to start doing business. I mean, think how much they could make!

But God had a different purpose. The disciples' occupation as fishermen was just a vehicle for God to demonstrate His great power and love. He wasn't blessing them with fish so that they would get excited about fishing - He was blessing them with fish so that they could get their eyes off their fishing and on to the greater call He had for them! Thankfully, they left the fishing business and went off with the Lord to do great and mighty things.

Let's make sure we're not getting up wrapped up in fish! We seek the Lord for His blessings, prosperity, and success. But true discipleship is focusing not on the blessings of the Lord, but on the Lord of the blessings!

We can rejoice in our blessings, but let's not dwell on them! Let's set our eyes on the Lord and the calling He has for us. When He sees that we have pure and willing hearts, He will be faithful to use us to accomplish His glorious plan!
