



We are facing, what the Prime Minister called, “this invisible killer” – a virus for which we have neither prevention nor cure. The Government’s advice is for us to “stay at home, protect the NHS and save lives.” We should only leave our homes for certain very limited purposes.

In line with this advice, and in order to lead by example, all Church of England churches are to remain closed for public worship and private prayer for the time being. But despite having to close St Michael’s Church, we should remember that the church is us, the people of God, not our buildings.

Each Sunday, we are having both an adult and a children’s & families service on our St Michael’s Church Website. Over Easter, we will have some additional services, with some reflections for Good Friday and also an additional All-Age Tonight (youth-friendly service) on Easter Sunday. I am very grateful to all who have been involved in this and to all of you who have responded to the services. Particular thanks go to David & Rachel Huxter, who have been sorting out the technical side to make it happen.

We have started a series, for both of our Sunday services, on the character of God. As human beings, we often find change hard. The coronavirus changes have affected all of us, and for some, it has been a particularly difficult time. Many will be feeling lonely, isolated and even fearful of what the future holds. We would encourage everyone to

continue to do all you can to stay in touch with each other, by phone or video conferencing (Skype, Facetime, Zoom, etc.).

As we approach Easter, we should remember our amazing creator God – our Holy God – who chose to send his only Son, Jesus, into the world. Jesus came to show what perfect love looks like in a human being. But Jesus came, ultimately, to die and rise to life again – to die for our sins, our wrongdoing, and to rise to life – to show that he has victory over death itself.

In these hard and changing times for many of us, we should remember that we have an unchanging God, because “Jesus Christ is the same, yesterday, today and forever.” (Hebrews 13:8)

May I encourage you to come each day, praising our loving and unchanging God. Please pray for our nation and our world – for a special measure of wisdom for world leaders, as we battle coronavirus. Pray for our health service – for the brave men & women who seek to save lives. Pray for those seeking to develop treatments, new hospitals and a vaccine for coronavirus – for success in their endeavours. And this Easter, please praise God for Jesus.

WHEN WILL I GET MY NEXT HAIRCUT?

Will it be in three weeks' time? When will Boris allow the barber shops to open? End of April, end of June?

TRIVIAL!

Worrying about a 'short back and sides' doesn't compare with the real worries that come from being confined to our houses.

How will we cope with the children being off school perhaps from now until September? Will there be enough food in shops? What about getting our medication? Suppose I want to see a doctor? How will I get to the surgery? Despite the Spring sunshine, those prone to depression may fear that dark cloud settling on them as the weeks go by. Worrying about getting to the barbers is laughable compared with other concerns.

THE CHRISTIAN GOOD NEWS TO THE RESCUE

Maybe our present difficulties and anxieties will help us to discover the truth of these words: '*...I will boast more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may rest upon me*' (2 Corinthians 12:10).

THORN IN THE FLESH

Just before these words the Apostle Paul spoke about asking God to take away from him what he called a '*thorn in the flesh*'. Wisely, he does not say exactly what it was. It could have been an illness or a person. It may have been the misery that comes from being locked in a prison cell. (That happened to him often.) It seems our heavenly Father allows all kinds of different 'thorns in the flesh' to come our way.

WHY?

We may ask for a quick solution to our problems. But God our Father allows them to encourage us to pray. Paul prayed. He asked that the thorn maybe removed. Three times he approached his heavenly Father. In the end he got his answer. His heavenly Father promised another gift – his power perfecting Paul’s weakness (2 Corinthians 12:10). That power turns out to be the presence and power of our Lord Jesus Christ (2 Corinthians 12:11). He goes on to say he even welcomes his difficulties because he knows the power of the Lord Jesus Christ with him. The ‘thorn’ was not removed but Someone greater came who beyond measure enabled him to cope.

GRINDING DOWN.

For some folk and some families, the call to stay at home may feel a bit like a holiday, but we may, little by little, begin to feel a little ‘stir-crazy’. We may feel lonely, perhaps get anxious about getting enough to eat, or worried about elderly parents and friends. Shut down could wear us down.

But Jesus Christ is stronger. Why not pray that you may know and experience his powerful presence? Then on that first Sunday when we are able to meet again, we probably excitedly will want to tell each other that in those weeks we knew the Lord Jesus Christ better.

LOOKING UP

Just to encourage ourselves and heighten the sense of the presence of the Lord Jesus why not read through a couple of Gospels? Let’s turn our isolation into the best holiday we have ever had with the best Friend we shall ever have.

THURSDAY 9th APRIL 2020

This day will be the 75th anniversary of one particular Nazi war-crime. The Nazis hung Dietrich Bonhoeffer in Flossenbergs prison on 9th April 1945.

He was a Christian pastor who long before many others in the middle of the 1930s saw the evil that lay behind Hitler's regime.

SAFE IN NEW YORK

He had left Germany but under the urgings of his Swiss friend, Karl Barth, gave up the safety of his teaching job in the USA to support and encourage what was called 'the Confessing Church'. This was a tiny rump of the old Lutheran church of Germany. The Nazis had taken over the old church and 'Aryanised' it. Jesus was presented as a blond and blue-eyed non-Jewish Aryran. Chunks of the Old Testament and parts of the New Testament were scrapped, old beliefs jettisoned, and pastors had to preach a religious kind of Nazism.

ZINGST & FINKENWALDE

To cut a long story short another Lutheran pastor, Martin Niemoller, got Bonhoeffer to set up a training college to prepare men to be Confessing Church pastors. The seminary was first in Zingst and then Finkewalde which were remote places on Germany's Baltic coast. It was hoped they would be remote enough to be out of the eyes of the Gestapo. Sadly not: the seminary was closed in August 1937 and went underground.

ARREST AND CONCENTRATION CAMPS

Bonhoeffer was arrested in 1944 as part of a round-up of those thought to be involved in the assassination plot against Adolf Hitler. He was moved from concentration camp to concentration camp until finally was taken to Flossenburg. He was hung on April 9th 1945 – just a month before Nazi Germany was defeated.

THE RESURRECTION

What can we learn from this twentieth century Christian martyr as we face COVID-19 which seems to be so victorious? We are confined to our homes; the nation grinds to a halt; the global economy slows. So far, we have no cure. We can't even get out to celebrate Easter together. But the man hung on April 9th 1945 found the living Lord Jesus more lovingly powerful than anything else in all creation. He already knew that the way of Lord Jesus Christ – the way of the cross- was the way to the Resurrection. If Jesus Christ conquered death, then an unknown virus is nothing.

SOMETHING WORTH LISTENING TO

A dear friend, and Lydia's godmother, contacted me recently to tell me about a series of talks on the radio that might be of interest to those who have been bereaved or those who are supporting someone who has been bereaved.

My friend has given me permission to share with you that in the last twelve months both her mother and father died and in 2017 her cherished goddaughter (Lydia) died.

While the talks focus on those whose children have died, they are relevant for anyone who has been bereaved and my friend found them helpful following the death of her parents.

The talks feature Pastor Colin Smith and were initially broadcast on Premier Christian Radio but can now be found on the website unlockingthebible.org. under radio archives.

They were broadcast on February 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 10, 11 and 12 this year and each broadcast is about 30 minutes long, (<https://unlockingthebible.org/archive>). The first talk is entitled Tears and Talk and the teaching is based on the book of Lamentations.

We often pray 'for those who have recently been bereaved' but we should also remember those who were bereaved many years ago who still may need support. If that is you, please tune in and see what you think.

I have listened to all the talks in the series, found the teaching helpful and intend to listen to them again.

You may have noticed that in this piece I have not referred to the person who has died as 'lost'; as Christians we know that we will see our loved ones again because of what Jesus did for us on the cross, so no believer is 'lost', they have just gone on ahead.

BELL RESTORATION UPDATE

(The following article was written before the coronavirus restrictions)

All our bells have now been tuned and new wheels have been made with other work progressing steadily.

At the moment the new headstocks are being made. Headstocks which contain the bushes that allow the bells to swing, are fitted to the crown of the bell and then attached to the frame. The frame is, in our case, a metal construction into which all the bells are hung and kept stable so as not to damage the fabric of the Tower.

The ringing chamber has been fitted with new seating and cupboards making for a more comfortable environment for ringers and visitors and is looking very smart.

The ringers themselves have kept busy by joining local towers, mainly Felsted and Witham and also Writtle and Chelmsford Cathedral, for their practice nights. They have also been helping with service ring, again at Felsted and Witham but also at Kelvedon and Coggeshall.

Debbie Hill has conducted her 1st Quarter Peal of Stedman Doubles and also Grandsire Triples. Peter Smith conducted a Quarter Peal containing 6 methods and 1 variation his most as conductor,

Not all of us have been busy ringing, the Master, Bradley Hill has been snowboarding!!!

The Northern District of the Essex Association of Change Ringers is celebrating the 100th year of its formation. To mark this centenary, it is hoped to ring 100 Quarter Peals encompassing all the District's ringable towers. Our ringers are helping with this by going wherever and whenever they are asked. We hope to contribute to this when our bells are back and ringing.

We are looking forward to the return of the bells. Hopefully soon.
