### My dear Friends

Two recent articles in *The Daily Telegraph* to which my attention was drawn made the same point: Christians like serious sermons, and rank the value of 'Biblical exposition' way above hipness and humour in the preacher. This emerges from research commissioned by the Christian

Resources Exhibition.

Humour in particular is frowned upon, as much of it is toecurlingly bad – most preachers apparently thinking they are funnier than they are. In fact Biblical exposition comes top of the list (44.3%) of what congregations think is most important in a sermon, with humour way down near the bottom at 1.6%.

Even more surprising, in my view, is that there is still an appetite for longer sermons. We are constantly being told about the diminishing attention spans of this channel-hopping age, yet less than 1% of the survey sample wanted a talk of less than 5 minutes. The most popular length is 10-20 minutes (44%), but as many as 36% favoured 20-30 minutes, which is the most usual length at St Michaels. (Only 10% of those asked wanted more than 30 minutes.)

Only 11% wanted no sermon at all, or to use the language of the survey, considered that 'the idea of a sermon being preached in church each week is outdated.'

In my first parish back in the 1980s there was a Reader who, if anyone complained about a sermon being too long, would retort: 'Sermonettes make Christianettes'. In the 1990s another friend of mine who is big on preaching deplored the constant call for 'little chats'. I sympathised with both of them, but had always assumed that they were fighting a losing battle, and that eventually the sermon would go the way of the dodo. This latest CRE research gives me new heart. St Michaels Braintree has always – or at least in the last few decades – set great store by the preaching and teaching of the Bible as God's word, and I personally hope that this will strongly influence the choice of the person who is to succeed me, though of course I hope and expect that they will have many other gifts as well. In his farewell to the Ephesians, Paul said: 'I commend you to God and to the word of his grace, which is able to build you up and to give you the inheritance among all those who are sanctified' (Acts 20.32).

I believe that sermons really do work, even if you can't remember much, if anything, from what you heard a week or two ago. I often can't remember what I had for lunch the previous day, but I know the meal did me good! And though we may not see instant results, look at the worn steps inside and outside our church building, and be reminded that continued exposure to the weather and repeated contact with thousands upon thousands of feet does make a difference, even upon hard stone.

And what about that seemingly-despised humour? Everyone knows, whether as speaker or audience, the embarrassment of a joke that falls flat, and the longer the build-up, the better the punchline has to be to justify the wait. But I do agree with former Archbishop of Canterbury Lord Carey, when he says: 'A really good joke can link in with the address and give a bit of a breathing space'. Anecdotes and jokes do give the congregation a chance to catch up: a sermon in which an eager note-taker is getting left behind is probably too dense. By the way, it's great that St Michaels does have some note-takers – they're such an encouragement.

Don't settle for anything less than a competent preacher – and keep listening!

### PCC Meeting 12 May Charles Mason

Andy Carter and David Henfrey were co-opted onto the PCC.



Charles led a time of prayer, with a theme of unity and harmony based on Ephesians 4. David Henfrey, David Huxter, David Marriott, Lin Terris and John Turton were appointed to the **Standing Committee**.

Following on from a question raised by John Turton at the March PCC (though unfortunately John was absent) there was a substantial discussion of the relationship between **Deanery Synod members, the PCC and the church**, and in particular whether Synod members are delegates of the PCC. It was clear that in law they are not, but are nonetheless expected to represent the views of their parish in Synod. This was particularly relevant with the likelihood that the Synod would discuss the vacancy at St Michaels in the coming months.

Lin Terris presented a report on recent meetings of the **Evangelism Group**, which had been mainly concerned with the celebration of The Queen's 90th birthday on 11 and 12 June, though they were also looking ahead to another Newcomers Tea and Film Afternoon in the autumn.

Charles reported on the **CHIP Group**, which was organizing Street Visitation, starting the following week, and had also discussed how best to recruit people for enquires' courses.

Joel Wicks produced a draft **Parish Safeguarding Statement**; no changes were required since last year. Sue Marriott and John Turton continue as our Safeguarding Reps for Children and Vulnerable Adults respectively.

Charles read out thankyou letters from Alan Radford, CMS, and The Christian Institute.

The next meeting of the PCC is scheduled for 21 July. **Bishop Roger** is due to attend on 8 September.

### **GARDENING TIPS**

The start of June brings to my garden one of my favourite things, blackcurrants. These simple fruit I find so easy to grow and so tasty. The small bushes of Ben Sarek just seem to produce with almost no effort and the smell you get from simply touching the leaves makes me think of stewed blackcurrants over a nice bowl of ice cream. I thus will be going out and harvesting them, and freezing all that I have spare ready for a winter's day.

I am still watching the Chilli experiment, although all seems quiet as they are now re-potted and starting to flower. I will I think be finding some good tomato food to lift their spirits.

Last month the boys and I planted a number of different sorts of sunflower, 6 different varieties in all. Some short and some tall. They germinated in about a week in the small polytunnel I had siting on the veg patch. So now I will look to plant them up, to attract the wildlife and to hide the fence.

One of the key things I enjoy about this time of year is making time to sit and reflect in the garden. My personal favourite flower the Aquilegia will be in full flower and I am always amazed at the colours that they bring. It



might be hard work keeping the weeds at bay, however it's really worth spending the time to see the beauty we have been given stewardship over.
