

Dear Friends

Granted, St Michaels is better placed as we have two thousand years of Christian practice and faith behind us but we are still moving forward into the unknown. attracts people to St Michaels and I realised that although it is easy to be drawn to a church because of its services, good speakers, facilities and fellowship that is not what makes people stay and declare for Christ. People were attracted to the early church because they saw God's power at work in lives. The generosity, sincerity, honesty and unity of the members shone out. This, surely, is what we should be copying.

Finally, Cyril and I wish to thank you all for your wonderful support so far.

He was flogged and then beheaded for his Christian Faith in about AD 165. He is known to us as Justin Martyr. He endeavoured to explain the Christian faith to the Roman world of his day, describing what Christians believe. He could be a real help to 21^{st} Century Christians.

<u>Martyr</u>

Did this bishop die in a persecution by a Roman emperor, Septimius Severus, around A.D. 202? He came up with the idea called 'Recapitulation'. That means that Jesus Christ is the second Adam, and our restoration in Christ means we will enjoy far greater glory than Adam ever knew. May be he has something encouraging to give the church of our times. Who is he? --- Irenaeus!

'Against the world'



Thank you also to those of you who have sent cards, letters and gifts, both before and since our departure. They really do mean a lot to us.




CHRISTIANITY EXPLORED, COMING SOON

HAVE YOU A PASSION FOR OUTREACH?

GARDENING TIPS

August is the time to enjoy fruits of the labour that has gone in earlier in the year. For me this includes the harvest of lovely fresh tomatoes, beans and chillies! Yes; the chilli plants are now producing lots of flowers and fruit.

I expect to pick the chillies and allow some of them to dry out. Leaving them on the side of the kitchen in a dry place enables them to be stored ready for cooking any time of the year. Simply take the dried chilli, cut up gently and add to sauce. It really works wonders when put simply with a tin of chopped tomatoes, and a dash of balsamic vinegar. (Great on pasta)

Tomatoes this year will be a blend of black, yellow, red, large and small, having this mix then really allows a salad to look colourful and a variety on the taste buds. I tend not to store them in the refrigerator if possible, as a tomato at room temperature has more flavour than its chilled cousin. Below is an example they could look like. Hopefully mine will be similar.



During this month, remember to continue to water plants if you are not there, and not to let them dry out. Warmth and heat can kill plants really quickly so make sure greenhouses don't get too hot.

August is the time where the children are at home and as a result the garden may take an extra stress. Therefore, look after the lawn by moving toys around so that one area does not particularly suffer. Be prepared to water spaces vacated by goal areas, covered by tents. Where grass has been compressed by pools and other heavy items, it is good to aerate, and feed so it can recover.



August days give you the chance to enjoy early morning and breakfast in the garden before the sun gets too strong and evenings after the heat of the day. So make the most of them and get out.
