#### Dear Friends,

The calendar we chose to put up in the kitchen this year is from the London School of Theology. Above the usual numbered dates for January are the words spoken by Jesus and reported in Matthew 28:19-20a generally referred to as the "Great Commission." They are very appropriate for the opening of a new year where we reaffirm our commitment as Christians to reach out to the whole world which is lost without Christ. I have deliberately not written out those words in this letter, instead encouraging you all to prayerfully open your Bible, read those words that actually come from the mouth of Jesus and consider how they are working out in your life right now.

The message on the January page of our calendar then goes on to tell us a bit about the Evangelical Alliance (perhaps best known to most of us through the work of our TEARfund reps) and the LST. They are passionate about lesus and seeing people come to know Him. There is a website which inspires a passion for evangelism in our communities, empowering individuals and churches to talk about Jesus and show God's love in words as well as deeds. They offer a wide range of resources intended to inspire and equip Christians not only to reach out but also pray for those who don't yet know Him. We are reminded that we are "Good News" people and as such should tell our story with confidence. And just before they offer some prayer points there are these sentences. "It is our belief that the Church is most effective in mission when we're united in purpose. So let's join together and make Jesus known." (Hey! Where have I heard those last 3 words in inspirational service?)

But then something strange happened on 1st February. I was at a prayer breakfast when one of my fellows said, "the church often talks about the Great Commission, but what about the "Great Omission"? A play on words that made my ears prick up. The

colleague went on to say that he thought the church often made a great thing about getting people in from outside but how much time did we spend getting to know the people already there? I don't think he meant just knowing the names of all the congregation. How much do we really know each other and how concerned are we for each other? Are there people in our congregation who are in need (of any kind) or feeling isolated and neglected?

As I listened to him I tried to resist feeling a little smug. I have seen a great deal of personal, practical help and concern for others from many of our parishioners who seek no public reward or acclaim for their good works done in the Name of Jesus. Equally people are entitled to their privacy and we must always respect that. On the other hand St. Paul lists gossip and gossipers in the pantheon of sins that spoil a church. However, don't let us be complacent, I know that I had to wipe out that smug feeling and accept the challenge that if there are those who do not feel able to share their hurting, where am I going wrong? After all, is it a proverb or just something my dear old mum used to say, "a burden shared is a burden halved".

So to the many of you who help others, thank you. To those who are hurting, we know Jesus loves you but can we help in any practical way? And to those who feel their present circumstances prevent them from opening up, our prayers are with you because our God knows and loves you.

## MISSION OF THE MONTH The Leprosy Mission

## An extract of some of the work of the Leprosy Mission:

In late 2016, Kate Gent visited Purulia Hospital in West Bengal to see how Leprosy Mission staff are dealing with a huge rise in patient numbers there. Here, she shares her story.

I've been told it's a busy outpatients' department here, with up to 300 people coming in every day.

It's Monday morning and it seems like all 300 people have all turned up in the past half hour, but even more keep streaming in.

Mornings in Purulia begin before the sun rises, with people travelling from miles around to come here. For me the sun is a low hazy glow on the horizon by the time I join the road.

The pinks and oranges filter through and paint the fields as amber. From the guest house I see the steady flow of travellers increase, many trundling past the gate wrapped up in shawls and blankets. They were nearing the end of their long journeys.

I walk down the dusty track towards the hospital. A bullock cart trundles by; a couple arrive; a mum with a small baby, an elderly man barely able to walk, weary already from the night of travelling.

Before me, the waiting room is abuzz with people. It's not even 9am and the place is nearly full. I struggle to get past. There are queues and queues of people – the queue is snaking out of the door. I'm amazed at the patience of the staff.

There aren't enough seats and so many people are sat on the cold stone floor. This is the reality of the outpatients' department of West Bengal's specialist leprosy hospital in Purulia. Later, it's mid-afternoon and I hear a doctor call out "Quick, quick, come quick!" There are over 50 people in the queue. "It's out of control!" she says.

At the back of the pharmacy queue are the mum and baby who I had seen sitting on the floor hours ago. They look exhausted. The little girl wants to go home. Her mum strokes her head and soothes her as best she can.

I make my way to a consultation room where an examination is taking place. The doctor does his best in the circumstances but it's a shared space and there are no curtains or a quiet area to talk confidentially.

Wrapped in a shawl, a young woman looks around to see the queue behind her is now a swarm spilling out the door. It makes me feel uncomfortable as they lean on the low partition peering over while her leg is examined.

I then meet Lavanya. She's travelled such a long way to get here, starting her journey in the dead of night. She travelled 60 miles by bus and on foot all to get to this place of healing. I try to hide my shock as she comes into the consultation room, avoiding all eye contact.

She's beautiful, wearing a bright orange cardigan and a green sari.

She was diagnosed with leprosy recently, and is now coming to Purulia to start her multidrug therapy – the course of drugs that will cure her.

## JUST WHAT IS THE NAME OF OUR CHURCH? 'ST. MICHAEL' OR 'ST. MICHAEL AND ALL ANGELS'

The answer from an article written by a previous vicar, possibly for the church magazine of his day - circa 1899

The Dedication Festival will be a continuation of the Harvest one - Thursday, September 29. This will be a proper occasion to write a few words respecting the ancient saintly name bestowed on Braintree Church. This church was dedicated to St. Michael the Archangel, and although we rightly and appropriately keep the feast of the dedication on the day of "St. Michael and All Angels," it is a mistake to call it "St. Michael and All Angels' Church" as far as can be ascertained this is a recent designation. In the book called 'Liber Regis' - the King's book - in the time of Henry VIII, it is entered "Braintree Vicarage, St. Michael," the vicar has found the following note entered in the Parish Records of last century – "Braintree Church dedicated to St. Michael." This note is of interest as shewing what the then vicar and parishioners understood the name of the church to be. All the county Histories both ancient and modern call this "St. Michael's Church, Braintree." Traces of a Warrior-angel's head are seen supporting the south-west arch of the nave; this figure is 700 years old. The stained glass window in the tower is occupied by a full figure of an Angel bearing the red cross shield of St Michael, copied from the Church roof - where there is an armour clad effigy representing the Archangel, with a lifted-up sword and the great dragon under his feet – this carving is 450 years old, is on the roof of the North chancel aisle. Churches of St. Michael invariably occupy elevated situations – standing on the high ground, or on mounts, St. Michael being the highest of the heavenly host. The Angel guardianwarrior, St. Michael, was connected with castles and places of eminence and defence and he appears to have been chosen by the Bishop of London, William De St. Mary who built a castle and resided in Church Street, Braintree, he re-built and re-founded the church in the year 1199 – nearly 700 years ago.

Although there are many Churches in different parts of the world dedicated to St. Michael, there appears to be but four other ancient churches of that name in Essex — Theydon, Alveley, Kirkley, and Woodham-Walter — We need hardly add that the old name in the church calendars is "Michaelmas Day" and the "All Angels" was not added until hundreds of years after Braintree Church was built.

These included a pyramid orchid, ling heather, Chinese water deer and a cinnamon moth. Alex also showed us pictures of more common, but rarely seen birds such as nightjar, skylark, and a beautiful golden pheasant. Alex punctuated his talk with demonstrations of birdcalls.

Next month Jim Wild will be giving us a talk entitled "Light, Colour and Confusion".

#### **GARDENING TIPS**

March is a time for enjoying the bulbs flowering in the garden. A bright combination of daffodils, crocuses, and maybe some last snowdrops and irises. The colour is a great reminder the winter has passed.

In the greenhouse look to what you wish to plant. Maybe a start on the tomato plants, chillies (yes mine didn't overwinter for the second year) and beans.

Look after the lawn by giving it a good rake to remove moss, any leftover leaves and to prepare it for feeding. Aerating the ground with a fork will take time, but is best done whilst the ground is soft still.


My last words are a reminder that we are not out of the frost season, so be careful with any tender plants you plan to put out.
