"Thy Kingdom Come" - a call to prayer

Dear Friends.

Corrie ten Boom said, "Prayer is powerful. The devil smiles when we make plans. He laughs when we get too busy. But he trembles when we pray ..." These are wise and true words, from a woman who endured the horrors of a Nazi concentration camp during the Second World War.

Prayer is a truly special gift of God. It is easy to busy ourselves with our plans, but it is when we come to God in prayer that we can hope and expect to see God at work in great power.

Jesus himself knew the importance of prayer. "Very early in the morning, while it was still dark, Jesus got up, left the house and went off to a solitary place, where he prayed." (Mark 1:35)

We would do well to follow Jesus' example. As the late Dr Billy Graham put it,

"In the morning, prayer is the key that opens to us the treasures of God's mercies and blessings; in the evening, it is the key that shuts us up under his protection and safeguard."

Justin Welby, the Archbishop of Canterbury, has called the churches across the world to pray. The initiative is called, "Thy Kingdom Come" and is focused on the period between Ascension Day (when Jesus returned to his Father) and Pentecost (when the Holy Spirit came down with great power on the early disciples). It is a call to pray that others will come to know the love of God, revealed in Jesus.

At St Michael's, we will be having a Prayer Day on Saturday 19th May. The church will be open from 12noon to 6pm and there will be a number of prayer stations inside the church. BELFRY BULLETIN

We held the St. Michael's Guild of Change Ringers AGM at Church House in the small hall on Monday 19 March 2018. We reviewed the past year and made planes for the coming year.

The Guilds Master, Bradley Hill, welcomed members to the meeting with a special welcome to the Guild President Rev Nigel Adams and Church Warden Lesley Davey.

Nigel opened the meeting with prayers. The minutes of the last AGM were passed and with no matters arising we preceded to the Officers reports.

The Masters report commended members for their commitment to service ringing with all members making a significant contribution to the Guilds progress. We had an enjoyable stay in the Peak District, rang 10 Quarter Peals 9 all Guild bands with many 1sts and for various significant occasions. With Kelvedon we won the EACR Northern District 6 bell striking competition.

The Steeple Keeper reported a quiet year. Replacing 2 ropes, muffling the bells for Remembrance Sunday. The rope on 2nd bell was lengthened for Nigel to ring during his induction service to indicate he has taken charge of the bells.

The Treasurer presented the accounts reporting a satisfactory year.

Nigel took the Chair for the election of Officers who were all reelected. Master Bradley Hill, Deputy Master Debbie Hill, Secretary Lin Ould, Treasurer Richard Ould, Steeple Keeper Bradley Hill, Deputy Steeple Keeper Phil Kelly.

Outings; We have a 3-day stay in Bedfordshire on the Ist weekend of June at the planning stage with the hope of an Autumn outing.

We had commissioned a report on the state of our bells from the EACR Technical Advisor. We have received a concise and comprehensive report from Nigel Taylor pinpointing the work needing to be done. After a detailed discussion it was decided to take out and retune bells 1,2 and 10, renew pulleys on bells 4 to 10, replace the 3 treble pulley sheaves, overhaul all clappers and staples and renew bushes on all bells. The sliders need sanding and covering in beeswax. Paint the frame. A big and expensive task.

We hope to extend our service ringing to at least I evening service a month, maybe with QP's.

We intend to ring for significant events in the coming year including the 200th anniversary of the Ist Blood Transfusion, as most members are or have been blood donors.

Ellis Whitehouse thanked the members for their friendship and welcome since his career brought him to Braintree.

Nigel brought the successful meeting to a close with thanks to the Guild and with prayer.

GARDENING TIPS

It is May in the garden and after a cold start to the year, the sun and heat is now in full flow.

This month can be a lot of work, depending on whether you are eagerly planting seeds, transplanting bedding plants, or even keeping the weeds under control.

In May I like to make sure that I find time for me to sit out there and enjoy the sun and see the beauty of creation at work.

If you have purchased tomato plants, now is the time to put them out. Those in the green house will be already growing nicely and as the frosts should have passed it will be ok to plant these out. I like a mix of tomatoes growing in the garden for my plate. The yellow and black cherry tomatoes are a pleasant change to the regular cherry we often grow.

May can see the beginning of the early Strawberries, though this year it could be interesting. In preparation of this, ensure that your plants have suitable protection from birds, snails, and the dreaded small child. Simple netting should suffice, though you may find that fitting it is hard, so a few good canes (or curved ones) might be useful to build a shell.

My eldest used to simply take the strawberries off the plant quick rinse and gone.... I do like them fresh and I see the point of getting in quickly before someone else does. Apparently, the strawberries start converting their natural sugars into starch from when they are picked, hence supermarket strawberries can lack the sweetness of fresh fruit.


