

MISSION OF THE MONTH STAND BY ME



Child-centred care

Stand by Me is a Christian Charity that works in the Dominican Republic, Colombia, Romania, Ethiopia, India, Nepal and Burma

Our Junior Church who meet on Sunday mornings continue to sponsor and support Tsion, who lives in Ethiopia. Small change into our collection pot each Sunday morning helps to make a change in Tsion's life. We enjoy receiving her letters and updates, displayed in Church House, which remind us that we are showing our faith in Jesus through our financial giving, and the letters and cards we send to Tsion.

Stand by Me describes its works as follows:

Truly caring for each child begins with considering the needs of the child, their family, and their community.

Loving care

We get to know each child — their hopes, history, needs and dreams. We delight in our children and want the best for them. We invest our time, love and attention raising them to know that they're loved and accepted for who they are.

Strong families

Usually the best place for a child to thrive is in their family – that's why we work hard to help families stay together. In the absence of a stable family, we place children who are at risk into our loving family homes.

Great education

A great quality education is key to escaping poverty. Our education programmes equip our kids with the skills they need to rise above their circumstances and help change their communities.

Access to healthcare

The health of our children is vital to their development and happiness, so we go the extra mile to make sure that they are fit and well, and can enjoy their childhood.

A reason for hope

It's a privilege to teach our kids of Jesus' love for them, and to demonstrate this through the quality of our care. As their desire for spiritual answers grows, we encourage them to discover a love, respect and knowledge of God for themselves.

Caring relationships

It's incredibly important to each child's sense of value and stability that they're raised by parents and teachers who care about them. Child sponsorship supports this further by giving our kids a relationship with a sponsor who loves them and helps them feel part of a wider family.

Our main types of care.

Each child is unique but like all children, the children in our care need unconditional love and acceptance. Because they come from complex backgrounds, we have developed four key care programmes to meet their individual needs.

Children's Homes

Our children's homes are just like any family home should be – comfortable, safe and filled with love. Our house parents love our kids like they are their own children, giving them all the support they need to thrive. As they grow, we equip them to become independent young adults. But even when they do grow up and leave our homes, they will always be our kids.

Schools

Our schools provide a quality education for children from our homes and the surrounding communities. Children who once had no educational opportunities are today transforming communities and achieving great things, with many graduating from university.

Care Centres

Our care centres bridge the gap for children who have families but need extra love and care. We provide children with tutoring, meals, clothes, medical care and a safe place to build relationships and have fun. We offer counselling for children with troubled backgrounds and help their parents through parenting courses and life development skills.

Family Support

We know that providing children with an education without tackling social, medical and family needs is futile. To help reduce parents' dependency on child labour, we provide families with food packs, help with rent, medical care and small business grants, enabling them to stand on their own feet and in time, live above the poverty line.

THE STATE OF OUR FINANCES

We rely on the generosity of worshippers – regular members and visitors – to pay for all the costs associated with maintaining the church buildings, employing staff, and fulfilling our mission to the people of Braintree.

People often feel uncomfortable when asking for money, but we are not ashamed of what we do at St Michael's to further God's work. We hope you too will value it, and be prepared to support us financially.

What does it cost to run St Michael's? About £13,000 per month to keep our Church ticking over.

Approximately 60% of that is due to the Diocese (to pay for our Vicar and assist poorer churches) and 10% of our collection goes to the charities we as a church support. This leaves us with approximately 30% to cover other costs such as our Youth work, Outreach, Emergency Maintenance, Heat & Light etc. **Unfortunately, we only receive an average of £12,000!** for which we are extremely grateful to all who give so generously.

Should we be able to cover this deficit we would need £1,000 per month, £33 per day or £10 per month from each family on our electoral roll. Should this be gift-aided this drops to £8.

I am aware that most of us find our finances stretched, but we give because we know that God has been even more generous to us. Giving isn't a membership fee; it's a response to God's unfailing generosity and grace, and to the needs of His church.

A salutary thought

The £1,000 per month mentioned only allows us to stand still and the Lord always moves us forward.

LETTER FROM MANDY SHORT

Schools become incredibly quiet when the children are not there, especially in the summer holidays. During the first week the school is often busy with adults, sorting out their classrooms, returning stock that they had vigorously denied having and storing the vast quantity of property the children have left behind.

The second week is quieter, only Roger and his team are working. By week four I have the school all to myself.

So here I am, sorting through my cupboards and reflecting on my time at St Michael's. My how eight years have flown. When I accepted the post of Head teacher of St Michael's primary School, back in 2010, I expected to be here until I retired, but that was to be in 2024, not 2018!

I was welcomed in September 2010 by the Governing Body, with a social evening at Church House. I was amazed at how many of the Governors were there, 100% turnout. It spoke volumes about their commitment to the school and of the links the school has with its' church.

To have led St Michael's Primary has been a career highlight for me and a time of enormous personal happiness. It is a very special place and the level of love and support given to the children by staff is second to none. A unique place, offering an outstanding education. St Michael's has always offered outstanding pastoral care, but it did not always offer a standard of education that our children deserved. From the start I was blessed with key members of staff that were ready, indeed chomping at the bit, to raise the bar on the quality of teaching and learning. New staff came and step by step the work ethos of the school changed. No more elongated lunch breaks because it was Friday and the sun was shinning, every minute counted and made a difference.

Although I am very proud of all we achieved in my time at St Michael's, it is not Ofsted's outstanding judgement that will be my lasting memory. As I sit in my rocking chair, basking in the sun on a tropical island, well maybe not the tropical island, my memories will be of the children: reading to me at lunchtime, making me laugh out loud on a daily basis and watching our Year 6 holding the hands of our Foundation Stage children as the school snakes it's way to St Michaels Church, every term.

Our links with St Michaels Church are strong and continue to grow. The foundation governors work tirelessly to support and challenge both myself and the staff, frequently visiting and playing an active role in the school: Ask Club and lunchtime Bible clubs reach out to all our children, as do the Easter and Christmas experiences, not to mention the weekly assemblies. The Chair of Governors, Jennifer Bailey, has been a endless source of support to the school, as she is to both myself and the Leadership team. I am confident leaving the future of our school in her hands, alongside her extremely competent board of governors.

I have so many memories of my time at St Michael's, many that make me laugh out loud. Some I will keep to myself and eventually publish to supplement my pension, others I enjoy sharing. Teacher's dressed as gorillas, French Pantomimes and being subjected to a makeover in aid of Comic Relief. My favourite memory linking the church and school is one of Graham Saville being escorted away by police at the Houses of Parliament as we went through security. Graham had used a backpack from a recent Scout trip and was found to have not one, not two, but three knives in his possession as he went through security. I was laughing so much it actually hurt. Wilbur and his friends were also laughing, and Mrs Jenkins had her head in her bag, but her shoulders were indicating that she too had lost control. Graham being the great sport that he is, enjoyed the teasing on his release and return to us. He was to accompany the school on so many trips, but that was his finest moment.

St Michael's Church plays such an important part in the life of our school, not least by praying for us on a regular basis. As the school goes through such a period of change I know you will all remember the school in your prayers and pray that it's new leader will build on all we have achieved, loving the school and all within it.

I too will pray for the school and look forward to joining you at St Michael's to worship with you from time to time.

Thank you for choosing me to lead St Michael's, it was a great privilege.




