Standing firm

Dear Friends,

Do you ever find yourself struggling to do what is right? You want to do what you know is right, but end up doing what is wrong.

If this is your experience, you are in good company. The apostle Paul described his struggle like this, "For I do not do the good I want, but the evil I do not want is what I keep on doing." (Romans 7:19)

We should not be surprised if we struggle with temptation. Even Jesus was tempted. We are now in Lent, the period of the church's year when we recall Jesus' temptations. Before Jesus began his public ministry, he was led by the Spirit into the wilderness, where he did not eat for 40 days (Luke 4:1-13).

Starving hungry, Jesus faced Satan's temptations – temptations regarding food, power and security. Each time, Jesus answered the devil from the Bible. Jesus stood firm in the face of the most demanding of temptations.

As we face temptation, God gives us the Bible to help us. There are promises that God will help us,

"God is faithful, and he will not let you be tempted beyond your ability, but with the temptation he will also provide the way of escape, that you may be able to endure it." (I Corinthians 10:13)

Also, promises that God will forgive us,

"If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." (I John 1:9)

God can make these promises to us because Jesus stood firm in the face of temptation. He chose to take the path of the Cross. That's what we remember solemnly on Good Friday, that Jesus died in our place, to pay the price for our sins. But we remember it joyfully on Easter Day, as we then recall that Jesus rose from death and gives us the hope of eternal life – life forever with God, where there is no more pain or suffering.

I hope you will be able to join us for at least one of our services over the Easter period, to reflect on what Jesus has done for us. And do please think and pray if there is someone you could invite to church this Easter.

MISSION OF THE MONTH THE BARNABAS FUND

What helps make Barnabas Fund distinctive in how it supports Christians who are being persecuted?

We work by:



- Directing our aid only to Christians, although its benefits may not be exclusive to them ("As we have opportunity, let us do good to all people, especially to those who belong to the family of believers." Galatians 6:10, emphasis added)
- Aiming the majority of our aid at Christians living in Muslim environments
- Channelling money from Christians through Christians to Christians
- Channelling money through existing structures in the countries where funds are sent (e.g. local churches or Christian organisations)
- Using the money to fund projects which have been developed by local Christians in their own communities, countries or regions
- Considering any request, however small
- Acting as equal partners with the persecuted Church, whose leaders often help shape our overall direction
- Acting on behalf of the persecuted Church, to be their voice making their needs known to Christians around the world and the injustice of their persecution known to governments and international bodies

We seek to:

- meet both practical and spiritual needs
- encourage, strengthen and enable the existing local Church and Christian communities so they can maintain their presence and witness rather than setting up our own structures or sending out missionaries
- tackle persecution at its root by making known the aspects of the Islamic faith and other ideologies that result in injustice and oppression of Christians and others
- inform and enable Christians in the West to respond to the growing challenge of Islam to Church, society and mission in their own countries

facilitate global intercession for the persecuted Church by providing comprehensive prayer material

We believe:

 we are called to address both religious and secular ideologies that deny full religious liberty to Christian minorities - while continuing to show God's love to all people



- in the clear Biblical teaching that Christians should treat all people of all faiths with love and compassion, even those who seek to persecute them
- in the power of prayer to change peoples lives and situations, either through grace to endure or through deliverance from suffering



GUILD AGM

The AGM was held on Monday 18th March in Church house Our guild Master Bradley Hill welcomed our vicar Revd. Nigel Adams, Churchwarden Dave Marriot and members to the meeting and invited Nigel to open the meeting with a prayer.

The idea was to get through the usual business as quickly as possible to leave plenty of time to discuss the Bells Restoration Project.

Apologies were received, the last AGM minutes, matters arising and Officers reports were accepted. The Masters report emphasised the progress Guild had made both collectively and individually.

As all the Officers were willing to carry on they were elected on bloc. Master Bradley Hill, Deputy Master Debbie Hill, Secretary Lin Ould, Treasurer Richard Ould, Steeple Keeper Bradley Hill and Deputy Steeple Keeper Phil Kelly.

Our weekend away this year is to Worcester on 21st-22nd and 23rd of June, with a day out later in the year hopefully to the Wisbech area. As a weekday ringing meeting went off without compliant it was felt that we could allow weekday ringing in a controlled manner.

The bells Restoration Project was discussed at length. An inspection had been carried out with the recommendation that all 10 bells be taken out retuned, refurbished with all the working parts renewed as required. The metal bell frame will be repainted against rust.

A programme of work to take place in the ringing chamber. Plaster, where needed, and paint the walls. Replace the carpet, seating, cupboards and door Installation of a simulator on all 10 bells with a possible camera feed to the main body of the church.

With the required approval it is hoped that the project will be finished in the 2nd quarter of 2020

To accomplish all this necessary work, quotes have been received which come to the estimated cost of \pounds 75,000 - \pounds 80,000. The possibility of raising this money was discussed and will be included in a forth coming Belfry Bulletin.

Revd. Nigel Adams complimented Bradley Hill on the very succinct, easy to follow and detailed report and commended all his efforts to date. Nigel brought a very encouraging and productive AGM to a close with a prayer.
