Confirmation

Dear Friends,

During September, we have the Right Revd Rod Thomas, Bishop of Maidstone, coming to conduct a Confirmation service at St Michael's.

But what is Confirmation? It is a service where the candidates are confirming (agreeing with) the promises that were made for them, by their parents and godparents, when they were baptised as infants (or that they made themselves as adults). These include turning away from sin (wrongdoing) and turning towards Jesus as Saviour.

The Bishop says some significant things to each of the candidates, addressing them by name and saying:

"God has called you by name and made you his own. Confirm, O Lord, your servant with your Holy Spirit."

The Bishop then asks them some potentially challenging questions, for example,

"Will you persevere in resisting evil and, whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord?"

The answer isn't "Yes" or "I'll try my best". The answer is, "With the help of God, I will." I find this answer both realistic and helpful. In different ways, we all struggle to resist evil and do what is right at times. But if we trust in God, we are promised that the Holy Spirit will come and live in us. We resist evil only with the help of God, not in our own strength alone. I find it a useful prayer to make my own, as I seek to serve God: "With the help of God, I will."

Would you consider supporting our Confirmation candidates in two ways? The first is to pray for them, as they publicly declare their faith.

The second is to join us for the Confirmation service – it is on Sunday 22nd September at 10am.

#### MISSION OF THE MONTH OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD



Operation Christmas Child is a branch of Samaritan's Purse, an evangelical Christian relief organization that provides aid to suffering people throughout the world who are victims of war, famine, natural disaster, poverty and disease.

Last year the UK sent 511,200 shoebox gifts to children in 11 countries across Eastern Europe, Africa, Central Asia and the Middle East. Of these 100 went from our church. Can we make it more this year?

#### What goes in a shoebox?

Shoeboxes are packed with gifts such as a soft toy, toy, stationary, toiletries, hat, jewelry. For most children this will be the first present they have received. There will be a display in church throughout October with leaflets giving details of items that can and cannot be included. Boxes are prepared for three age groups, 2-4, 5-9 and 10-14 years. Samples for these will be on display.

Please note: from this year we are unable to send toothpaste and sweets.

The requested transport cost per box is £5.

# I'd like to help but can't fill a box

Donations of items that go into boxes are always welcome. We will make up some 'church boxes' from these. All boxes have to be checked at a warehouse to fulfil custom regulations. Donations are used there to help fill up some boxes. Monetary gifts are always welcome to aid with transport costs and other expenses.

#### When does my box need to be ready?

Although the advertised dates are later please can boxes and donations be in church by Sunday November 3rd.

#### The Greatest Journey

All boxes are distributed by Samaritan's Purse workers linking with local churches. Where the culture allows it, and the local church is able, children receiving boxes are given the opportunity to take part in a 12 session course called The Greatest Journey if their parents or guardian consent. This enables them to find out who Jesus is, begin their own journey of faith and share it with others.

#### Coffee Morning Saturday November 2nd 10-12 noon

Proceeds from this will help with transport costs for the boxes we make up with church donations of items.

# CAN YOU HELP SPONSOR A PASTOR'S TRAINING?



#### JOHN HOWARD 1726-1790

A philanthropist dedicated to prison reform and public health improvement.

Born in 1726 the son of a wealthy upholsterer in Hackney, he was educated in Dissenting circles. His wife was a chuchwoman and he attended the parish church with her. In 1742 he inherited wealth and moved to a large estate in Bedfordshire.

In 1773 he became High Sheriff of Bedford. One of his duties was to oversee the county gaol, and he was horrified by conditions there, and visited numerous prisons and hospitals in England, where he found that conditions were just as bad.

His first step was to secure official salaries for gaolers, who hitherto had relied on extorting fees from prisoners for their food, bedding and even their release. This led to 2 parliamentary acts, one abolishing gaolers' fees and one enforcing better conditions to improve prisoners' health.

He then embarked on extensive visits to prisons abroad, oblivious of the dangers of travel and disease, which he financed himself. He made 7 major journeys all over Europe (80,000 kms).

He died in 1790, in the Ukraine, contracting typhoid while visiting a Russian military prison.

His writings included "The state of prisons in England and Wales", which led to the reform act, and "An account of the principal lazarettos in Europe".

The Howard Association was formed in his memory in 1866, and merged in 1921 with the Penal Reform League to become the Howard League for Penal Reform, which nowadays concerns itself with many aspects of the criminal justice system. Its stated aim is: lees crime, safer communities and fewer people in prison.

#### WORLD WAR 2 MEMORIES


Helen Kemp has written her memories of her father's life during the war.

'My father was amongst many who were called up. He did not say a lot about his time in the army, but I do know that he was sent to a camp for basic training and then to North Africa. He was lucky enough not to ever encounter front line action. The unit then moved to Italy and upwards through Europe towards Germany. I do remember him saying that they were so far back behind the lines that they didn't know V.E. had been declared until a few days later!

He was one of many in his generation who never took a driving test, but was told to get into a lorry and drive it over rocky terrain on a hillside. He continued to drive army lorries during the war and this qualified him to drive on British roads!'

Thank you to everyone who has given us memories and family stories of life during the 2nd World War. We will be very glad to receive more memories, memorabilia and artefacts for the exhibition to be held around Remembrance Day in November.

# HARVEST FESTIVAL COLLECTION

For our harvest Festival this year we will be supporting the Braintree Area Foodbank with their Harvest Festival Collections. The Foodbank has over 80 agencies that give food vouchers to those in immediate need. We then support them with an emergency food parcel that lasts three to four days. It is our aim to help and support all those in poverty by providing a food parcel for those in crisis across the Braintree District. Since 1st April this year we have fed 1,970 people, 859 of those being children, that is 300 more than the same period last year. This equates to 17,730 meals, averaging 3,546 meals provided per month, to those in need. The most wonderful thing would be that all Foodbanks could close their doors because everyone had sufficient resources to support themselves, but in this time of such uncertainty we cannot see that happening. Anything you are able to give will be much appreciated by those who receive it.

The Foodbank would like to thank you in advance for any donation you give.

PLEASE NOTE: We are grateful for your donations to the Braintree Area foodbank. However, we can only accept donations of freshly-bought, unopened and undamaged goods which are still well within their "use by" date (no less than 6 months). We cannot use items which do not meet these requirements, and the donation is wasted. Thank you.
