## **“For where your treasure is ...”**

Dear Friends,

The quote above is from our Verse of the Year for 2020,

*“For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.” (Matthew 6:21)*

They are words of Jesus, given in the Sermon on the Mount. Jesus had been calling on his hearers not to lay up treasures on earth. He gave two reasons for this. Firstly, earthly treasures are subject to decay – moth and rust can destroy them. Secondly, they can be subject to theft – thieves break in and steal them.

For some people, getting money and wealth seem to be the main motivation in life. It is as if the purpose of life is to acquire as much “stuff” as possible. But material possessions are at best temporary. I wonder how many expensive Christmas gifts will still be truly treasured in 5 or 10 years time.

But there is another kind of treasure. Jesus speaks of “treasures in heaven” – a kind of treasure that neither moth nor rust destroys. A kind of treasure that thieves cannot break in and steal.

What does Jesus mean by “treasures in heaven”? I believe he means more than money given to Christian causes that has an eternal impact. If we know God’s saving grace, I believe we are called to store up treasure in heaven by seeking to become more Christlike – more like Jesus.

What do you treasure? If we are honest, it might be our possessions, or other things such as our career, positions of influence or power or a particular relationship.

This New Year, it would be good for each of us to reflect on what we treasure. What is most important in life to us?

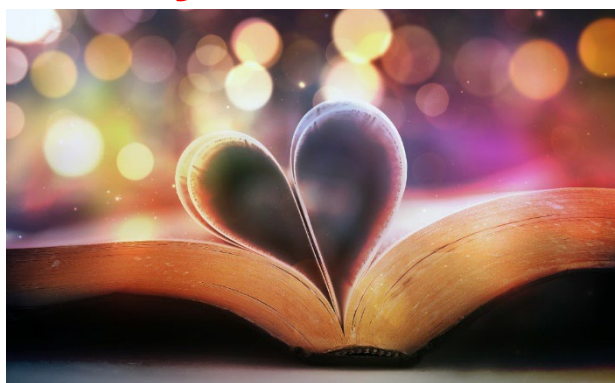
Have we discovered “treasure in heaven” – that personal relationship with a loving God, who made us and sent his Son to live and die for us? In January, we will be running a three-week course called 321. The three is about God, Father Son & Holy Spirit. The two is about Adam and Jesus – Adam, who disobeyed God and Jesus who brought us back to God. The one is us – how will we respond to such a God? We will be showing some excellent videos by Glen Scrivener and there is time for discussion.

Tragically at the beginning of November Chris Naylor (CEO of A Rocha International) and his wife, Susanna, and Miranda Harris wife of Peter, were killed in a road crash whilst working in South Africa. Please continue to pray for their families and friends and the continued work of A Rocha.

A Rocha Ghana has just celebrated 20 years as a committed environmental NGO. ## **A CHURCHWARDEN WRITES**

I know it's been a while since I wrote in the magazine, time flies when you're busy. Now I have a little time and thought I would give an update on what we have achieved over the last year and where we are planning on working in the near future.

Firstly, thanks to all who have given on Gift day towards the projects that we grouped together as "Sharing the Light". The funds raised have already been allocated towards the new lights in Church, Church House and the Audio-Visual updates.

So far, you will see that Church House has most of its new lights. This is the first phase of the update, with the main hall and the addition of some more functionality planned for February Half Term. For new features, the toilets have sensors and will turn on/off by themselves and the kitchen has an under the cupboard lighting to replace one of the ceiling lights.

With regards to Audio-Visual, the day of Gift Day saw our 9-year old projector develop a fault where it started putting lines in everything. A new projector has been installed just ahead of Christmas. Whilst not

part of the original piece we wanted to do; this was on the list to be done over the 3 years.

The Church's lights are currently on order and will be replaced in the Spring.

With regards to other works: decorating inside Church House has gone well, though now it has a lot of cracks to fill, ceilings to paint etc. (So, help at works parties and other times to paint would be greatly appreciated).

Inside the Church, Lodges have been repairing the walls and the external drainage following completion of the roof repairs. When this has all dried out this will be finished.


We have experimented with carpet on the pews, and it's been generally positive in making the seats warmer to sit on, though fixing to the pews has been an issue for the longer pieces. We intend to carpet 3 more long pews with the carpet we have in stock before deciding the next move.
