

FARMING SEASONS



October is an important month on the farm because it is the month we commonly drill our winter cereals. This year October has been a mixed month with some heavy periods of rainfall but thankfully, thanks to a dry spell in the middle, we finished drilling our winter wheat by the 15th. This came as a relief because the soil has become quite saturated this year and too much rain would have made drilling tricky.

The damp conditions have been good for slugs, who are pests which can hollow out the seed before it germinates or graze off the new shoots as they appear, so it has been necessary to keep a close eye on the crop as it begins to germinate by regularly walking the fields looking for slug activity and damage. This is a job my dog, Cherry, especially enjoys and it is important because we do not want to use slug pellets unless it is necessary.

Last month I mentioned soil and how important it is to our farming success, so important in fact that Jesus Himself even refers to soil fertility in the Parable of the Sower. Jesus was drawing on the fact that the condition of the soil hugely affects how readily seeds will grow – he was challenging his hearers to consider how receptive their lives were to His message.

The objective when we cultivate and till the soil is to create a good 'seedbed'. This means removing any compaction which would inhibit drainage, and excess trash in the way of previous crop residues and weeds and producing a reasonably level and fine soil crumb structure which provides good seed to soil consolidation. This helps with quick and even germination and makes the seed well hidden from pests such as slugs.

We are fortunate that the soil on our farm has generally good fertility. This is largely due to the natural soil itself and also the good management that has taken place by my Grandad and Dad with good drainage and applications of farmyard manures which improve the soils organic matter content.

Organic matter only makes up around 3 to 5 percent of the top soils in our area but it plays a crucial role in the soils fertility. This is because it helps improve drainage and the workability of the soil further encouraging micro organisms and earthworms. Worms are our greatest cultivators helping to oxygenate the soil, breaking organic matter into nutrients and improving drainage. Keen gardeners improve their organic matter content with the use of the compost heap and I notice that garden programmes are often using it in the bought form know as soil conditioner/improver. Organic matter is made from carbon compounds which come from decaying plant and animal waste. Carbon is an element that is the biological building block of life and it has more compounds than there are other elements. It is currently the 'hottest' topic on the planet at the moment because of its role in global warming and climate change where the gas carbon dioxide plays a key role in the carbon cycle.

The proportion of carbon dioxide in our atmosphere has significantly increased because of the dramatic rise in the use of fossil fuels over the last 50 years or more and now the agricultural industry needs to look at its part to see how it can become carbon neutral in the future. In my Grandads generation they would have been much closer to this relying more on organic manure from their smaller mixed farm operations and crop rotation to provide the plant nutrients and weed control.

However, in my Dads farming generation the demand for greater productivity led to a much greater use of artificial fertilizers and agrochemicals which use large amounts of fossil fuels in their high energy production. The greatest challenge for the future is for us to maintain the high levels of production while reverting back to the lower levels of fossil fuel usage and thereby carbon footprint of my Grandads generation. In the next article, I will be taking a closer look at some of the ideas for the future of how this might be achieved.
