Dear Friends,

The situation in Ukraine, since Russia's invasion, has been one of deep sadness. It has brought into our homes the pictures of war. What has been different for our generation is the immediacy of the reporting – seeing day by day the damage, destruction, injuries and deaths. It shows us, if we needed to see it, the horror, waste and futility of war. Do please continue to pray that a lasting peace can be found.

There was something else, near the beginning of the invasion, that moved me. It was the reporting of families fleeing west, to Poland and the other adjoining countries. As they arrived at the border, many of the Ukrainian men said goodbye to their wives and children ... they then travelled back into Ukraine (men with <u>and</u> without military experience) to take up arms to defend their country. One can only imagine what might have been in their minds as they said their goodbyes. Many people show great sacrifice in times of war – men & women, combatants & civilians, those on both sides of the conflict.

Easter reminds us of the greatest sacrifice ever made. In a sense, it is a sacrifice made in time of war ... God's war against sin and death. It is about a Father sending his Son into battle ... to fight on our behalf against a cunning and ruthless enemy, Satan. It's a battle that we know Jesus won for us. His death paid the price for our sin ... when we say sorry to God, he is able to forgive us completely. And Jesus' rising to life again, on that first Easter Day, gives us the sure and certain hope of eternity with God ... the heavenly hope.

That's what we remember at Easter. We have a lot happening this Easter, including SMASH Club for primary school aged children.

MISSION OF THE MONTH CHAIN FOUNDATION

Our links with Chain Foundation as a Church go right back to its beginning. Archbishop Livingstone from Uganda came to St. Michaels in 1999 for our 800th anniversary. This was when we first got to know him and he told us then that he had noticed a real need for children in Uganda who were being orphaned.

In 2001, the Chain Foundation Uganda orphanage was started by retired Archbishop Livingstone Nkoyoyo in response to the needs of local orphans, former street children, abandoned children, and the disabled.

The foundation is home to more than 100 orphans and other vulnerable children, including over 40 blind students.

The Chain Home provides a loving, Christian environment to meet the children's physical, educational, medical, and spiritual needs. The foundation also assists many at-risk or disabled children who live in nearby communities, and provides community education programmes.

The Chain Foundation is located in Mukono, 20 kilometers from the capital city of Kampala.

The School at the Chain Foundation opened in February 2009. It is the first school of its kind in Uganda, integrating blind and sighted children. This model school currently serves over 300 students from the orphanage and from nearby villages. The library at the school has an expansive selection of books, including Braille books for the blind students.

Archbishop Livingstone's nephew Stone is currently one of the main managers at Chain Foundation and has visited St. Michaels on a number of occasions. Chain Foundation has grown over the years, when my parents visited about 7-8 years ago there was a real need for fresh fruit and veg as it was expensive and the children didn't get very much very often.

Now though, the Chain Foundation have their own farms with animals and plenty of fruit and veg being worked on by the staff, the children and young people learning a trade.

Young people from the surrounding villages learn trade skills including farming, welding, tailoring, shoe making and hairdressing.

All of the work is done against a backdrop of the Chain Foundation sharing the love of Jesus through daily devotionals and their care for the whole area.

'STAFFORDSHIRE BILL'

William Thomas^{*} was also known as 'Staffordshire Bill'. From his pony and cart he sold fish in 1920s Aberavon in South Wales. More often than not the pony pulled the cart home at the end of the day with Staffordhsire Bill lying drunk among the unsold fish at the bottom of the cart.

3 ATTEMPTS

Most Sundays he was among the last to leave the local working men's club with his foul mouth and what was called 'low moral standards', more often than not, drunk. But just before the club closed one Sunday he heard some men talking about a visit one of them had made to hear the new local pastor. 'I was there last Sunday night and the preacher said nobody was hopeless'.

That struck home to Staffordshire Bill and he made up his mind to go to hear the new preacher, Martyn Lloyd Jones.

He set out twice, but it was not until the third Sunday that he had the courage to go through the door into the Chapel.

DRUNKENESS 'REPAIRED'

That Sunday night he heard about the new life Jesus Christ gives. He turned to Jesus Christ and found the life of the risen Lord Jesus was able to break his drink problem. He was a new man.

ONE PROBLEM REMAINED

The risen Lord Jesus enabled him to master his drink issue. But one old power remained: he couldn't master his foul mouth. He was in despair. And one day after swearing and verbally abusing his wife, he called on the risen Lord Jesus to set him free. The risen Lord Jesus did so. He gave him power to master his rotten speech.

THE RESURRECTION OF JESUS CHRIST

We often speak about the Christian as someone who, having turned to Jesus Christ, and so enjoys the risen life of the Lord Jesus to remake them.

The Apostle Paul writes about the resurrection of Jesus Christ as something that happens to every believing Christian. Have a look at Romans 6:4. Colossians 2:12 & 3:9-11.

William Thomas's experience of being set free from things like the rotting shame of being often drunk among the dead fish and a bad mouth, has been the experience of many Christians since the first resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ, and since the 1920s.

AGAIN & AGAIN

Whilst many believing Christians have found the living Lord Jesus able to free them from rotten habits, others have found the old powers in us don't quit so easily. So every day they have had to call on risen Lord Jesus to kill the old powers and enable them to walk in his ways. When the old powers have triumphed, they've gone back to the Lord Jesus who died, asking for his forgiveness and his resurrection life to get them going again.

Easter says that the living Lord Jesus Christ can and does set us free from those powers within us which drag us away from God.
