

## PLATINUM JUBILEE

Dear Friends,

As the Queen's Platinum Jubilee approaches here is reminder of her Coronation.

**3<sup>rd</sup> JUNE 1953**

*'Our gracious Queen: to keep your Majesty ever mindful of the law and the Gospel of God as the Rule for the whole life and government of Christian Princes, we present you with this Book, the most valuable thing this world affords. Here is Wisdom; This is the royal Law; These are the lively Oracles of God'.*

The Right Reverend James Pitt-Watson, Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, spoke these words in the Coronation service of our present Queen Elizabeth on 2<sup>nd</sup> June 1953 as he gave her a Bible.

**SHE SEEMS TO HAVE READ IT.**

How can that be said? Perhaps it's your custom to listen to the Queen's Speech at 3.00pm on Christmas Day. It seems without fail she mentions something of her own personal faith. She remarks about how important that the teachings of Jesus Christ are to her.

**NOT EXEMPT**

And yet on Christmas afternoon – in the famous and annual Queen's Speech she speaks about her conviction to

**Maple Avenue entrance and who knows, it could make the difference to someone.**

## FARMING SEASON

The month of May is probably my favourite month as everything is bursting into life in the countryside. The crops on the farm become more lush and vibrant as the wheat starts to grow rapidly and the oilseed rape brightens up the landscape with its dazzling yellow flowers. April was a busy month for me on the farm because as the crop begins its main growing phase the inputs of fertilizer and agri chemicals increase.



At the time of writing many farmers have started grumbling about the lack of recent rainfall and not a lot appears to be forecast in the near future. I am not overly concerned yet because at this stage the crops have the capacity to compensate for this dry period when the rain does hopefully come. I have been more interested in our latest investment which is the purchase of a new (ex demonstrator) tractor,

shown here. We part exchanged two of our older tractors to help buy this 'state of the art machine'. This tractor boasts a newly designed cab which sits separately from the engine allowing a smoother and quieter ride. This feature also helps keep the cab cooler relying less on air conditioning as the 265HP engine generates a lot of noise and heat when working hard. The new DYNA 7 gearbox works like an automatic giving the driver a smoother and efficient ride, but my favourite feature is the new touchscreen digital monitor which allows the driver to see all the functionality of the machine and also view its satellite navigation positioning. The tractor also has an app which is on my mobile phone so the tractors performance can be monitored remotely.

Agriculture outside our farm is still dominated by the terrible war in Ukraine. In my previous article, I looked at how important this country was in terms of its agricultural output to the wider world. In this article, I thought I would look at the further consequences on agriculture because of the war and fallout with Russia.

Russia together with Belarus plays an important part in world agriculture not only because of its own immense crop output (Russia and Ukraine combined supply about a third of the global wheat exports) but also because they helped supply important commodities which are needed in the production of agricultural products. The most obvious is the supply of natural gas from Siberia which is used in the production of nitrogen fertilizer. The restriction of this supply has caused bottlenecks in the market which have led to dramatic price increases. For example liquid nitrogen fertilizer was costing me a year ago around £300 per meter cubed and today its just under £900. From a farming point of view this has been off set by higher commodity prices, but the price increases are beginning to be felt by the consumers at the end of the supply chains. Basic food commodities like wheat, barley, soya and oilseed rape etc. represent key inputs in many of the other food products we buy.

Russia is also a significant producer of nitrogen fertilizer itself, but more significantly Russia and Belarus account for 40% of the worlds Potash (K) fertilizer, another key agricultural crop input. The crops in Europe are now becoming advanced and growing so this is not an immediate concern, but in other parts of the world which are approaching their planting season like South America, it is. In Brazil, which is one of the worlds largest importers of fertilizer, potash is a vital input into their soya crop (this crop does not require nitrogen fertilizer). Other countries will have to step up their own production of these key inputs to help combat the drastic decline in the supply of fertilizers. For example

China can increase its supply of nitrogen fertilizer and Canada has large resources of Potash fertilizer, however despite this there will be short term disruption and longer term prices will find new highs.

So I am sorry to say that not only is the future uncertain but prices for the final consumers will definitely be going up, which is something you have probably already noticed. However, concerning this may be, the proportion of our incomes spent on food is relatively small compared to poorer countries such as India and in Africa. There is a real danger that farmers in Africa, for example, may not be able to afford the increased prices in crop inputs and as a result may suffer much lower crop yields leading to food shortages! This could potentially be an unexpected outcome of the war between Russia and Ukraine and it is undoubtedly something which we all need to be aware of.

## ECO CHURCH – CARING FOR GOD’S WORLD

I’m sure most of you already know that A Rocha is one of our Missions of the Month, that we as a church support financially and prayerfully.

But what you may not know is that we are in the process of applying to be part of the Eco Church Project. This is an award scheme for churches who want to demonstrate that the gospel is good news for God’s earth. Chelmsford Diocese is actively encouraging participation.

Nigel has set up a small committee, comprising Ann Mahood, Ade Odupitan and Sophie Wells, and we are working through the application process.

This covers all aspects of our church and personal life:

**Buildings** - how energy efficient are these? And can we improve our efficiency?

**Land** - encouraging wildlife, avoiding harmful chemicals, community and global engagement - this is wide ranging - everything from raising awareness locally to using fair trade and locally produced products when serving coffee or meals as a church.

**Lifestyle** - walking or using public transport rather than just jumping in the car for short journeys, encouraging recycling, worship and teaching - praying for environmental issues, teaching about creation care in junior church and in church.

The questions we are answering are challenging both individually and as a church.

Separately, A Rocha has great podcasts for listening to in the car, out walking or wherever you normally listen. Field notes podcast explores the themes of conservation and hope through a wide lens: guest speakers include a mother, a wine theologian,

a Hebrew scholar, an environmental historian and a linguistic philosopher among others.

Or just a browse through the websites of A Rocha UK and A Rocha international will certainly give food for thought.

## FEELING "EMPTY"?

***"That He would grant you, according to the riches of His glory, to be strengthened with might through His Spirit in the inner man, that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith; that you, being rooted and grounded in love, may be able to comprehend with all the saints what is the width and length and depth and height — to know the love of Christ which passes knowledge; that you may be filled with all the fullness of God." (Ephesians 3:16-19)***

In one sermon, D.L. Moody held up a glass and asked, "How can I get the air out of this glass?" One man shouted, "Suck it out with a pump!" Moody replied, "That would create a vacuum and shatter the glass." After numerous other suggestions, Moody smiled, took out a pitcher of water, and filled the glass. "There," he said, "all the air is now removed."

He used this simple demonstration to explain that living a victorious life is not accomplished by "sucking out a sin here and there," but by being filled with the Holy Spirit.

Later, he said, "I believe firmly that the moment our hearts are emptied of pride and selfishness and ambition and everything that is contrary to God's law, the Holy Spirit will fill every corner of our hearts. But if we are full of pride and conceit and ambition and the world, there is no room for the Spirit of God. We must be emptied before we can be filled."

Let's begin emptying ourselves today! We need to be filled with God's Spirit so that we can be empowered to do great things! There's no way around it!

## Countdown solutions and scoring:

Round	Best available:
1	<p><b>L</b> Lots of options here. You could have scored 6 with ALTERS, 7 with REPLAYS, and 8 was the maximum with PLASTERY and SEPTUARY.</p> <p>There were also three harder 8s, which are anagrams of each other – PEYTRALS (pieces of armour on a horse), PSALTERY (a medieval musical instrument) and PTERYLAS (tracts on a bird's skin in which feathers grow).</p>
2	<p><b>L</b> SCOOP scores 5, CLUMPS for 6, and just one 7-letter word in COPIOUS.</p>
3	<p><b>N</b> A couple of methods:</p> <p><math>5-1=4</math>, <math>4 \times 6=24</math>, then <math>5 \times 100=500</math>, and <math>500+24=524</math>.  <math>100+5=105</math>, <math>105 \times 5=525</math>, <math>525-1=524</math>.</p> <p>Score 10 points if you hit the target, 7 points if you were within five of the target (519-529), and 5 points if you were within ten (514-534).</p>
4	<p><b>L</b> HIVES was there for 5, EQUIPS for 6, and just one 7-letter word in QUICHES.</p>
5	<p><b>L</b> RINSES for 6, HEIRESS and SHRINES for 7, and just one 8-letter word available with RESHINES (seems appropriate from "He Is Risen").</p>
6	<p><b>N</b> To reach this target, you need to "split" a multiple.
